What does English look like at North Road?

At North Road, we encourage and foster a love of reading through the use of specially designed areas in which 'reading for pleasure' can take place. We use both our indoor and outdoor environment, for example the school library, classroom reading spaces and our playground reading teepee. We follow the Reading Vipers approach to reading, which is taught daily and focuses on teaching vocabulary, inference, prediction, explaining, retrieving and summarising. We are a reading staff and all classrooms have a teachers bookshelf where 'recommended reads' and favourite books can be borrowed. All pupils enjoy listening to a story or chapter of their class book before the end of the school day. In our weekly teacher assemblies, we share text by an 'author of the term'. These link to mental, physical health and school values. All pupils have the opportunity to regularly visit the school library. We promote the habit of daily reading through our school reading awards.

Phonics is taught daily in Early Years and Key Stage 1. Where appropriate, pupils in Key Stage 2 receive phonics lessons. We recognise the importance of nurturing a culture where pupils take pride in their writing, can write clearly and accurately and adapt their language and style for a range of contexts. We want to inspire our pupils to be confident and competent in the art of speaking and listening, so that they can communicate their ideas and emotions to others effectively. We use drama and role-play across the school to encourage creative writing. Our cross-curricular approach provides many enriched opportunities to develop and apply writing skills across the curriculum.
